

### Funding and Grants for Preschools in the Bay Area

EarlyJ's central goal is to support Jewish preschools and help them succeed. We know how challenging it can be to balance budgets and secure funding for operations, salaries, professional development, and daily needs, which is why we are here to help. Recognizing that searching for grant opportunities can be time-consuming and complex, the EarlyJ team has researched and compiled a simplified list of relevant grants tailored to Jewish Bay Area preschools. We hope you will find this list helpful in securing additional funding for your preschool.

We encourage you to share this resource with your development teams. If you know of any additional opportunities not included here, please let us know so we can add them to the list and continue to support the broader Jewish early childhood education community.

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#### **National Grants**

**National grants** are funding opportunities across the U.S. provided by government agencies, private foundations, and nonprofit organizations to support various projects, programs, and initiatives.

**Federal grants** and resources dedicated to preschool programs and early childhood education (ages 0-5) are primarily administered by the U.S. Departments of Health and Human Services (HHS) and Education (ED). Most federal grants for preschool programs are distributed to states or large organizations, and the application process can be lengthy. Below, you can find some grants you can apply for directly. We encourage you to follow the grants' websites to learn about changes and due dates as the year progresses. All government grants are listed on Grants.gov, where you can search by keyword to find specific relevant results.
